

Joseph

The Aim of the Session

To explore the life of Joseph, I Ith son of Jacob, grandson of Isaac and great-grandson of Abraham (the subject of last week's study). A dreamer of strange dreams, an interpreter of dreams, a man who rose and fell more often than Reginald Perrin and who inspired a West End musical block buster – what can we learn from him?

• Welcome

Sibling rivalry - what stories can you share? Perhaps your own experiences or at second hand?

Worship

Read Romans 8:28. Reflect together – would you be prepared to follow the Lord and his teaching even if it brings you into conflict with the powerful? Do you/ can you believe that all things work together for good? And is that promise made to all people or to a specific group? If so, who? How does this fit with your experience?

Praise God for his protection and his promises. Pray for a strengthened faith maybe?

Word

The story of Joseph runs from Genesis 37 and 39 - 50. It would be great to read it in advance – it is an easy and exciting read. It's not practical to read it all at a house group meeting though.

Read Genesis 37:1-14, 18-36 (or the whole chapter if you prefer)

- What reasons did Joseph give his brothers to dislike him?
- ➤ How close did Joseph come to dying at age 17? What factors saved his life?
- Where was God in these events?

Read Genesis 39:1-3; 6b-12; 16-20

- Trace Joseph's rise from slave and his fall to prisoner. What did he do to bring about his downfall?
- Was he a downright fool? Read Matt 10:28 for Jesus' view on right behaviour.

Read Genesis 39:21-23

Ch 40 tells the story of two fellow prisoners, who have dreams – and Joseph successfully interprets them. Since it is unlikely there will be enough time to read it all, read Gen 40:8 & 23

➤ Joseph has a responsible role even in prison. You can't keep a good man down ... is it that simple? What was God's role in his rise?

> Joseph may have thought the Butler would have got him out of prison, but he was forgotten (for two years). Have you had similar deferred / dashed expectations?

Ch 41 tells how, unlikely as it was, Joseph ends up interpreting Pharoah's dreams – and at age 30, gets appointed as the second-in-command to the most powerful person on the planet (probably – and certainly in his known world). Read 41:39-41

- What did Joseph do and what did God do to bring about this meteoric rise?
- ➤ How does the promise of Romans 8:28 look now?

Ch 42-45 tells the story of how Joseph's brothers come to Egypt in desperate need – and the dream of the 17 year-old Joseph does come to pass. Long story short, after some testing, Joseph sees that his brothers are now (much) better people and reveals his identity

- How would you expect Joseph to react, now they are at his mercy?
- ➤ How do you expect the brothers to react? (see Gen 45:3)
- ➤ How does Joseph react? Why? (see Gen 45:5, 7-8, Gen 50:20)
- Again, how does the promise of Romans 8:28 look now?

Links into the New Testament

- A person despised by his people, attacked and nearly destroyed, yet who is forgiving to those who attacked him, and by whom a remnant are saved does that make you think of a major NT figure is it valid to see Joseph as a faint echo of the Messiah?
- ➤ Hebrew II includes Joseph in the list of major figures of faith (Heb II:22); the trust that Joseph had was in the big promise of God especially in returning to the promised land, from which Joseph had drawn his family.

Works

So where do we go from here?

- Can Christians expect their lives to be always happy? Or joyful? Or victorious? What does God promise?
- How do we deal with the high stages of life (see Joseph as the favourite son/ the overseer at Potiphar's house/ the de-facto chief jailer/ the chief minister of Egypt)
- ❖ How do we deal with the lows Joseph was enslaved, and then falsely accused of attempted rape as revenge for his integrity.
- ❖ How do we follow Joseph's example and act to please God, even if it means losing everything (rejecting Potiphar's wife's tempting offer)? (see e.g. I Peter 2:19-21, Matt 5:11-12; you may have other references)
